(BACKGROUND – NOT TO BE SHARED WITH COMPETITORS)

Scenario Location: open room low ceiling backup indoor

Team Info:

Your team is at a local business for an open house. While there a bystander comes over stating that a vendor was working with their beehives and due to an accident with their protective gear, they have received multiple bee stings.

Overall Scenario:

While working with their bee hives to move bees to a new hive, the beekeeper dropped the equipment. They received a sting initially and in a panic, pulled off their head gear. Received multiple stings on head and arms as a result of this. Found with their hands on their knees in a tripod position appearing anxious. Multiple stingers still present on both arms and head.

Scenario Set Up:

- Total number of patients:
- Patient #1 Found with their hands on their knees in a tripod position appearing anxious
- Scenario Props: x4(Beehives, Blue tooth Speaker (Bee Sounds), Honey Jar, EpiPen)
- First Aid Supplies Required: FA Kit(s), Splints (legs & Arm) Blankets, PCR's
- MFR Supplies: Oxygen Kit(s), BVM

Timing Notes:

Team handout/ Scenario background to be given to teams PRIOR to the beginning of the scenario BEFORE the Scenario BEGINS

0 minutes - Scenario BEGINS - "GO, GO, GO."

3 minutes – for the end of the marking of "scene/primary survey"

18 minutes – 2 minutes remaining - for the team's benefit.

20 minutes – Scenario ENDS. Teams may have up to <u>5 minutes</u> to complete their paperwork and submit it to their judge.

25 minutes - Paperwork ENDS. Judges collect PCR immediately and ensure ALL boxes are completed. NO debrief with teams will occur at the Scenario Site. Debrief data will be forwarded to teams through coach contacts in due course after the event.

Judges Marking

- items are scored as either **Completed** or **NOT COMPLETED** if Not **FULLY** completed.
- If teams continue to provide patient care (i.e.: finish tying a bandage, etc.) after time is called, that care will be counted as **NOT COMPLETED**.

You're a summer student working at a local honey Warehouse clearing out what should be empty beehives and cleaning them for them to be sent back to the farm. When you open the hive That was supposed to be dead from the winter, it was filled with bees that's swarmed to you.

You are unable to administer the EpiPen on your own and need their assistance After receiving the EpiPen you will, initially have some relief before having a panic onset causing you not to be able to breathe and they will assist you with and bag valve mask. your breathing them becomes under control and you can breathe on your own.
